

He also wrote to several private schools in the area. I visited a meeting of home schoolers in the Kingwood/Humble area as well as a local private school and provided information on our programs. Several Piney Woods members have volunteered to help with the Outstanding American History Teacher effort, the Elementary Poster Contest, the Eagle Scout Contest, and the ROTC/JROTC awards.

Security on October 28th. Jim Mitchell gave a presentation at the Red River Valley Chapter in Paris also in October.

Jim Jones, Ray Cox, Larry Stevens, and John Beard attended the Fall Board of Managers meeting in Houston the last weekend in October. At that meeting, the Piney Woods chapter presented TXSSAR President Jim Jones with a check for \$500 for the CAAH. The NSSAR had put out a request that each SAR chapter make a \$500 donation to the CAAH to help pay down the debt, and the Piney Woods chapter was the 3<sup>rd</sup> chapter in Texas to do so. During the Saturday luncheon at the BOM, the Piney Woods chapter presented a Fire Safety award to Adam Carlin, who was one of several Fire Fighters receiving awards in honor of Fire Safety month.

John Beard was presented with a Meritorious Service medal by TXSSAR President Jim Jones for his work on the Sarbanes Oxley procedures which he helped set up both for TXSSAR and NSSAR.

Other good news received at the BOM was the nomination of Jim Mitchell for the Patriot award. Jim was nominated on the strength of his service in the area of Patriot Grave identification and marking,

### The Revolution



November 10, 1775: The Corps of Marines created by a resolution of the Continental Congress.

November 16, 1776: America receives its first cannon salute – 11 guns, 2 less than the 13 to nations. The Lesser Antilles governor fires it after the captain of the privateer, “USS Andrew Doria,” shows him a copy of the Declaration of Independence.

November 17, 1777: The Continental Congress submits the Articles of Confederation to the states for ratification.

November 19, 1778: Newspaper ad: “All those men who have deserted from General Count Pulaski’s legion, and will deliver themselves up at the general’s quarters at Sussex Courthouse in New Jersey on or before the 19th of November instant, shall have the general’s free pardon — And those who do not return by that time shall, if caught, be punished as a general court-martial shall direct agreeable to the articles of war.”

November 24, 1779: Washington to John Jay, President of the Continental Congress: “I am now using my best endeavours to get things in train for putting the Army in quarters. The Distribution of cloathing, owing to its late arrival, the scantiness of the stock, the diversity in colour and in quality, its not having been properly sorted when passed, the absence of cloathiers, under various pretences, forgetting articles that would be deficient &c., has proved a matter of most irksome delay and difficulty. . .”

November 25, 1780: Pacifist Quakers, accused of being Tories, get treated as enemies: “On this date, two unconnected Quakers were hanged for two unconnected treason convictions,” a fellow prisoner writes. “They were taken out amidst a crowd of spectators — walked after a cart in which were two coffins and a ladder, etc., each had a rope about his neck and their arms tied behin them. . . they were both hanged in the commons of this city abt. 1 o’clock.”

November 29, 1781: Slave ship “Zong” dumps 133 Africans into the Atlantic for insurance.

November 30, 1782: U.S. and Britain sign Preliminary Peace Articles in Paris, ending the Revolutionary War..

November 2, 1783: Rocky Hill, New Jersey, General Washington gives his “Farewell Address to the Army.”

Ed and Jane still fly a lighted American flag 24 hours a day at their home in the Pinehurst subdivision of Atascocita. On November 10th, Larry and I both served at another Naturalization Ceremony held aboard the Battleship Texas on the day before Veterans Day. In this one ceremony, Sylvia Halfhill of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), incorporated the swearing in of new citizens, a salute to Veterans (including numerous DHS employees present at the ceremony), and a tribute to the Marine Corps 235<sup>th</sup> birthday! This was followed on the same day with attendance by Ray Cox and Jim Mitchell at the 235th Birthday of the U.S. Marine Corps and Wreath Laying Ceremony at Town Green Park in The Woodlands.

After many long years of service, Bob McKenna has requested his retirement from the Registrar position, and Larry Stevens has agreed to accept this position. Bob has provided valuable and faithful service to the Piney Woods chapter as President and Registrar, has been instrumental in setting up several of our Patriot grave making ceremonies, and served as emcee for

**Naturalization Ceremony held aboard the Battleship Texas**

The group mustered at 9:15 AM, John Thompson arrived a little later and is not in the first picture. The Naturalization ceremony was scheduled to begin at 10 AM but was delayed until 10:15 AM for late arrivals. US Army Colonel Danny F. Tilzey was "kind of an emigrant" from Manchester UK, in the industrial Midlands of England, near Liverpool and the BEATLES. Although born in Glendale (LA), California, his parents divorced and mom took him to Manchester. He returned when about 18 years old, with \$100 in his pocket and landed in Akron, Ohio, worked on a family farm, then joined the Army. After discharge, he used his GI Bill money for college and returned to the Army as an officer. He served in Desert Storm and two trips to Iraq. His story of "Coming to America" was one that all those being Naturalized could relate to. Standing in front of them, holding our Flag, I saw their understanding glances.

**BOOKTIPS**

Gerald Carbone, author of “Nathanael Greene,” likes powerful images. He tries to end every chapter with an explosion, each page with a firecracker. By chapter three, the reader wants to wave a white flag.

With that tribute behind us, “Nathanael Greene” has just about everything you could ask for in a history of a half-forgotten hero. Carbone tells us right off that Greene and Washington had a trait in common: Both were skilled at sizing-up men. Washington made Greene a general almost as soon as he set eyes on him. Greene kept a clean camp and that’s what Washington was looking for. Greene, for his part, took one look at Thomas Paine and made him an aide.


Histories have given us men of the Continental Congress who putter along in one direction and fighting men in another. Here we learn that General Greene turned to John Adams to get veterans’ pensions through Congress. Fighting men getting laws passed. This is a different look at fighting men.

Carbone’s loves apocrypha. Crossing the Delaware, Washington says to Henry Knox, “Shift that fat ass, Harry. But slowly, or you’ll swamp the damned boat!” Never happened. Carbone admits it. Good story, though.

True story: Christmas Day 1776, 2,400 half-frozen men assembled. Washington orders officers to read Paine’s “These are the times that try men’s souls” to the troops. Then they march. Really happened. Carbone is generous with stories about Washington, fond as he is of Greene.

Major General Greene fought in the big battles — Trenton, Princeton, Brandywine, Germantown. A dozen in all. When the war moved south, that’s when he made his reputation as a general of genius.

The book’s out in paperback. Spend \$8.00 on Ebay. You won’t regret it.
