From the President:



Members and Friends,

November marks two significant holidays and recognitions during the month of November, Veterans Day and Thanksgiving, and I thought it would be good to reflect on the history of each day.

Firstly, we honor all of our veterans on Veterans Day, November 11th. Originally called Armistice Day commemorating the end of World War I, the "war to end all wars." In 1926, Congress officially recognized the date as the end of World War I, and in 1938, it became an official holiday. But after World War II and the Korean War, at the urging of veterans' service organizations, on June 1, 1954, Congress amended the commemoration by changing the word "armistice" to "veterans" so the day would honor American veterans of all wars. In 1968 Congress changed the celebration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday every October beginning in 1971. However, it became ap-

parent most U.S. citizens wanted to celebrate Veterans Day on November 11th. On September 20, 1975, President Gerald Ford signed another law returning the annual observance to November 11th starting in 1978.

Canada and Australia both call November 11th Remembrance Day. Canada's observance is similar to our own and many of its citizens wear red poppy flowers to honor their war dead. In Australia, the day is more like our Memorial Day. Great Britain calls it Remembrance Day but observes it on the Sunday closest to November 11th with parades, services and two minutes of silence in London to those who lost their lives in war.

Abraham Lincoln's 1863 proclamation established Thanksgiving as the national holiday we celebrate today, making him the father of modern Thanksgiving. The Revolutionary generation, however, created the first national Thanksgiving holidays 157 years after the Pilgrims and 85 years before Lincoln's historic proclamation.

The Continental Congress issued nine proclamations calling for days of thanksgiving. By the time of the Continental Congress, days of fasting and thanksgiving had become intertwined with politics, as many in the Revolutionary War generation identified liberty as a divine gift that they were obligated to defend. Calls for days of fasting or thanksgiving throughout the colonies had the added benefit of promoting unity by giving everyone an opportunity demonstrate commitment to the Patriot cause.

Politics aside, for the founders, Thanksgiving remained a religious occasion. Thanking God

for his divine intervention in America's affairs did not end with the Revolution. The founding generation continued the practice after establishing the country as a constitutional republic under the current U.S. Constitution. George Washington, in his first year as president, proclaimed a Thanksgiving Day for the end of November 1789, "That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks – for this kind care and protection of the People of this country previous to their becoming a Nation."

Just as America has changed since the Revolution, so has Thanksgiving, becoming more secular and private. The founders would not recognize many of today's traditions, but there is nothing to stop us from understanding theirs. Perhaps, as we gather for the holiday this year, we might recall those first thanksgivings Americans celebrated as a country, when they gave thanks for the nation's blessings and not only those that graced the lives around the table. 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution 2025-2033

The National Society Sons of the American Revolution has challenged every SAR State Society and Chapter to recognize those events that led to the American Revolution, as well as those events that occurred during the Revolution. Each SAR State Society and Chapter should hold public venues to educate, recognize, honor, and celebrate the events and heroes of the period surrounding the American Revolution. These events will be significate events related directly to acts of resistance of British attempts to coerce the residents in American from the first Parliamentary Act, through the armed struggle, until the Treaty of Paris.

Old Humble Cemetery CLEAN-UP

Located at the corner of Isaacs Road and Old Humble Road, this is the oldest cemetery in Humble, Texas. The town founded in 1870 was named after its founder Pleasant S. Humble.

"Most people who shop at Home Depot or work at the Humble ISD Administrative Building probably are unaware that a forgotten cemetery, overgrown with weeds and thorns,

lies in their backyard", Pam Gibbons, Houston

In a Tribune article by Historian and local resident Robert James Meaux published May 28, 2019, wrote a great article on the History of Old Humble Cemetery (available on ourtribume.com"), "The old Humble Cemetery. I'm sure you've seen it. It's the old



country cemetery at the corner of Old Humble Road

and Isaack's Road, just across the street from St. Mary Magdalene Catholic Church. It has a gate with a narrow dirt road going down the middle of the cemetery. If you haven't seen it, then get over there and have a look. There is a lot of history in that cemetery! The cemetery originally started out as the Dunman Family

Cemetery. Humble's original settler, Alamo Rider Joseph Dunman, was buried there back in 1859. There are several Denman's' buried in the back, northwest corner of the cemetery, although we don't know where Joseph Dunman's 1859 grave is because it is not marked. After 1860, the Dunman family allowed other people to bury their departed family members on this land, and it slowly became the community cemetery....."

The James Tull Chapter TXDAR has taken this on this Fall. And, this is not the first time the DAR, the DRT, SAR, and the SRT, have volunteered to make the place pretty again.




NOVEMBER In the American Revolution

November 1, 1775 In Philadelphia, Congress learns King George III rejected the colonial congress petition known as the "Olive Branch", which was an attempt to reconcile differences and avert civil war. Congress adopted the Petition on July 5, 1775. King George was told the American Colonist were loyal subjects and just wanted their rights as British Citizens. "We, your Majesty's faithful subjects of the colonies of new Hampshire, Massachusetts bay, Rhode island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina, in behalf of ourselves, and the inhabitants of these colonies, who have deputed us to represent them in general Congress, entreat your Majesty's gracious attention to this humble petition." Ironically, the Declaration of Independence was circulated July 5, 1776; just one year later...

November 16, 1776 General Howe takes Fort Washington on the East side of the Hudson and the Continental abandon Ft. Lee on the West Bank. General George Washington's

devastating, and disastrous Manhattan Island campaign ended on November 16, 1776. After Howe defeated the Continentals at White Plains, New York, on October 28, he focused his attention on Fort Washington defended by Colonel Robert Magaw, who General Greene had told to hold the Fort. Greene and Magaw felt secure after a successful bombardment on the British Fleet and repulsing Hessian attacks in early November. However, Howe launched a three prong attack breaking through the outer defenses. Trapped, Colonel Magaw surrendered the Fort at 3:00 pm; with 2800 Continentals taken prisoner. Washington learned of the surrender of Magaw and his men. With the British Fleet controlling the Hudson River and Howe's Army preparing to cross, Washington led the



Continentals away from Ft Lee. General Howe ordered to Lord Cornwallis, "clear the rebel troops from New Jersey without a major engagement, and do so quickly before the weather changes".

November and December 1776 New Jersey. The British led by Cornwallis invaded New Jersey occupying Newark on November 28, 1776, and then he marched for New Brunswick to Capture Washington. Known as the "Crossroads of the American Revolution", New Jersey



Hudson River Bombardment of the British Fleet November 1776


played a pivotal role in the revolution with around 296 battles. The British invasion in November 1776 was just the beginning of a long campaign with Trenton on December 25-26, 1776, Battle of Assunpink Creek on January 2, 1777 also known as the 2nd Battle of Trenton, and the Battle at Princeton, January 3, 1777.

On the night of November 19, 1776, the British ferried 5,000 troops across the Hudson. On November 20th, General Lord Cornwallis organized his force. The same date Nathanial Greene hurriedly

marched his 2000 men out of Fort Lee to join General Washington at Hackensack. He was able to beat the British to the one bridge to cross the Hackensack River.
