#### From the President:



#### Members and Friends,

We officially kicked off our Fall 2022 to Spring 2023 meetings last month on August 20<sup>th</sup> with a highly informative presentation about the recent national congress in Savannah, Georgia by Chapter Registrar Larry Stevens. Many thanks to Larry for a great PowerPoint accompanying his presentation. We also had a wonderful turnout for the meeting. The room at Union Kitchen holds 30 maximum, and we had 29 compatriots and guests in attendance.

Looking at the calendar, September is full of Revolutionary War historical events and others important in our nation's history. For example, September 17<sup>th</sup> marks the 235<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Constitutional Convention representatives signing the final draft of our Constitution. On February 21, 1787, the Continental Congress called for a national convention to meet in

Philadelphia to revise the Articles of Confederation. By May 25<sup>th</sup>, the state delegates had reached a quorum and the Constitutional Convention officially began. George Washington was selected unanimously as president of the Convention. From the outset, delegates clashed over issues of state sovereignty while small and large states battled over the distribution of power. The product of four months of secret debate, the Constitution replaced the Articles of Confederation and proposed an entirely new form of government. Although the Constitutional Convention met for the last time on September 17, 1787, public debate over the Constitution was just beginning. The Constitution specified that at least nine states ratify the new form of government, but everyone hoped for nearly unanimous approval. As the states called their own ratifying conventions, arguments for and against the document resurfaced. Writing under the pseudonym Publius, Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and John Jay defended the proposed plan in a series of newspaper articles, later collected as the *Federalist Papers*. I remember reading these influential documents in my freshman year political science class.

Another significant date I want to highlight is September 13<sup>th</sup> which marks the 208<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beginning of the 25-hour bombardment of the American forces at Fort McHenry during the Battle of Baltimore. Francis Scott Key, a young lawyer, was detained in Baltimore harbor under guard by the British navy. Key had boarded a British ship to negotiate the release of his friend, an American physician, from British forces. Key's experience during the bombardment of Fort McHenry inspired him to pen the words to "The Star-Spangled Banner." He adapted his lyrics to the tune of "Anacreon in Heaven", the official song of the Anacreontic Society, an 18th-century gentlemen's club of amateur musicians in London. The song with Key's lyrics soon became the de facto national anthem of the United States of

America. Congress officially recognized it in 1931. A note of trivia..... writer F. Scott Fitzgerald was named in honor if his distant cousin Francis Scott Key.

I want to remind everyone of the upcoming Board of Managers meeting in Plano between October 21 and the 23<sup>rd</sup> at the Hilton Dallas/Plano Granite Park. Registration for the meeting is online through September 17<sup>th</sup>. Information about the meeting was sent to compatriots in a TXSSAR email on September 1<sup>st</sup>.

Our next chapter meeting will be on September 17th at The Union Kitchen in Kingwood, and

Chapter Compatriot Ray Cox will give his presentation on fifing. I saw this presentation at a Freedom Chapter meeting earlier this Spring, and really enjoyed it.

#### **SAVANNAH!**

This old town is a great visit. Unfortunately we spent nearly all of our time in SAR Events and did not get to walk around. The afternoon thunderstorms made this easier to take. And, in July Savannah heat and humidity are at a high. It is best in the late Spring and early Fall.

Located on the Savannah River, with shops and restaurants, ferry tours, cargo ships passing nearly as tall as the Hyatt, the Olde Towne of Savannah historic district just across the street, and the hotel itself, built where once sloops docked to unload new immigrants and goods, this location was great for a congress.

Savannah's history is unique to the other English Colonies. In November 1732, General James Oglethorpe and a total of 114 Men, women, and children set sail aboard the ANNE for the new colony of Georgia. The voyage took Eighty-Eight days. The Anne sailed up the Savannah River in February 1733 and tied up at a high bank. Oglethorpe officially named this new land Georgia in honor of King George II of England. Georgia became the thirteenth Colony.

Exploring the area, Ogletyhrope met the local natives of the Yamacraw and became acquainted with their Chief Tomochichi. Tomochichi gave Oglethorpe permission to establish a settlement at what is Savannah today. On February 12, 1773, the new colonist, militia, and African slaves began clearing the pine forest on what they named Yamacraw Bluff.



The friendship of Oglethorpe and Tomochichi led to the only peaceful settlement of the thirteen colonies. Tomochichi allowed new settlers to arrive, and the city flourished.



The Yamacraw Tribe, 1728-1743, lived in what is now Savannah. They were a small tribal group that spilt away from the Lower Creeks and Yamasee of Florida to South Carolina. The Yamasee and Creek had formed an alliance to fight the British in the back country in 1715. Two years later a peace was negotiated and the Creek resumed trade with the British. The Yamasee broke their alliance.


The small group that became known as the Yamacraw left both the Creeks and the Yamasee and settled on the Savannah River at what is known as Yamacraw Bluff. When Oglethorpe arrived, he and Tribal Chief Tomochichi met, and it was agreed by the two that the Yamacraw would move upriver. Tomochichi

died in 1739 and his son Toonhawi became the chief. He died just a short time after in 1743. What Yamacraw were left moved West rejoining their Creeks relatives.

General James Oglethorpe had a master plan for the city. It was the only city built in the American Colonies with a plan. The streets were drawn out using a grid, so the streets were nearly distance apart and the blocks were about the same size. The plan included open spaces for parks throughout the layout. Twenty-two of these survive today making walking about the old town a great experience.

The charter for the settlement was part of a plan to settle the working poor, underprivileged, and prisoners in the new world to give them a fresh start. They were allowed to worship as they please, but rum, lawyers and slavery were not allowed. The Georgia settlement was to be a buffer between South Carolina and the Spanish in Florida. Johnson Park is the grave site of Nathaniel Green who died of sun stroke on June 19<sup>th</sup>, 1786, in Savannah. There is a fifty feet tall monument in honor of General Green. His remains were moved to this park in 1902 and reinterned.



The old town is mostly the same today except some streets were

closed for a block and buildings added. In 1778 during the Revolutionary War, the British captured Savannah and by 1780 controlled Georgia and most of South Carolina. Finally, General Greene sent "Mad" Anthony Wayne to drive the British out of Georgia in 1782. Wayne retook Savannah and drove the British to Charleston.



This brief history of Savannah I presented at the last

PineyWoods meeting at the request Gen Nathaniel Greene

of President Anderson to discuss the 132th SAR Congress. As a historian, I



couldn't do so without talking about the history of Georgia.

Georgia was unique to say the least. It was the only colony of the 13 that did not endure years of War with the Native Americans.

Slavery did come to Georgia before the Revolution more an more due to the increase of large plantations and the change to cotton as a major crop raised for export.

President General Wright took breaks during the business meeting to present awards. He presented Judge Tom Lawrence the newest medal, the Gold Meritorious Service Medal. This is the first year medals presented by the President General will be Gold. The recommendation was made by the NSSAR Medals and Awards Committee and approved by the trustees.

PG Davis present Larry Stevens, Vice President General South Central District, with the Gold Roger Sherman Medal, also new. This Meals and a Certificate of Recognition for his work as the VPG South Central District for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022.

Previous medals presented by a President General can be replaced with the new Gold Medals if the recipient presents a copy of the medal award certificate that accompanied the medal.

Business Meetings or Sessions are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday at different hours generally beginning at 9 AM. However, there are many events scheduled, and not in this order, like the Youth Awards Luncheon, Breakfasts and Lunches, Memorial Service was on Monday this year, followed the First Lady's Tea.

**Ethics Committee Report** – Judge Tom Lawrence, Past SAR PG and member of the Paul Carrington Chapter, who is the Chairman of the SAR Ethics Committee reviewed in detail changes proposed to the cur-

rent SAR Ethics Policy in the Bylaws. The changes were adding language to clarify actions that could be construed as violations of our Ethics Policy. He said these changes need to be made and he requested the delegates approve his motion. The motion was passed. The finalized version will be written into the Bylaws. Tom stressed the importance of the State Societies adopt the Ethics Policy and add to their Bylaws and Constitutions.

**Genealogy Policies** were discussed and why members application approved prior to 2012 need to be checked when being used as proof for other application and supplementals. As the task force headed by Gary Green, of North Carolina, entered membership application into the digital data based, *numerous errors were found that had to be corrected and a large number required research to add missing and not cited proof documents*. He some were redlined and can not be used due to wrong ancestor or just no proofs to the ancestor at all. Gary said the Genealogy Committee feels this ruling is necessary to validate our new digital Patriot Records Service. *This did not require any action by the delegates*.

**250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee** Chairman Cliff Olsen of Missouri said state societies and chapters need to check out the 250<sup>th</sup> NSSAR 250<sup>th</sup> Website. Events, and materials to assist in events, 250<sup>th</sup> Merchandise-Medals and Artifacts, are available. *If you have hosted 250<sup>th</sup> SAR Events or participated, you need to report these activities through your state contacts*.

Kent Gregory of California and Chairman of the **Museum Committee** said more donations have allowed the purchase of more Revolutionary War and Colonial Era items. Some of these are on display at the SAR Library.

**Building Construction including the Museum** - PG Wright announced that in the special Trustees meeting on July 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2022, the Trustees approved and recommended the Museum Plan by Solid Light. After a brief review, a motion was made to approve the plan and it was unanimously.



**Major John Buchanan** 

New member Anthony R. Love lived just across the street from Kim Morton, our long time chapter Genealogist who pass away last year. Anthony said he thought of joining the Sons of the American Revolution for some time.

Compatriot Love descends from American Patriot 2nd Lt James Buchanan who served in North Carolina (now Tennessee), and his spouse Margaret Kennedy. He was born in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania on 12 Jan 1759 and died in Nashville on 7 Nov 1832.

John Buchanan became one of the first settlers, of what is now Nashville, Tennessee, joining General James Robertson in December 1778.

Tennessee was Washington County, North Carolina in 1778,

and Nashborough Fort, at present day Nashville, was a place of refuge for the few that ventured there. There was a constant threat from the Indians with many small confrontations. Walking to the farm field to work was not safe with men laying in wait. The Battle of Bluff at Fort Nashborough in 1781, where John's brother Alexander Buchanan died, was one of the larger confrontations on the frontier in Tennessee.


#### Poster Contest

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) invites all 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students interested in the American Revolution to participate in the Americanism Elementary School Poster Contest. The contest is open to public school, parochial, home schooled, Scouting, or Children of the American Revolution member students in that same grade range. Students must use standard 22" by 28" poster stock. Poster and paperwork due into chapter by February 1st, 2023.

Texas Prizes are as follows: 1st Place - \$300 Cash; 2nd Place - \$200 Cash; 3rd Place - \$150 Cash; 4th and 5th Place - \$100 Cash. The topic for 2022 - 2023 year's contest is: "Revolutionary Person or Persons"

The 2022 Texas poster winner was submitted by the William Barron Chapter. This poster was sent to Savannah for the NSSAR Poster Contest as the Texas entry.

The NSSAR First Place Poster was a Monopoly like "Game" about the 250th Anniversary of the June 9, 1773, burning of the HMS Gaspee in Rhode Island. The was an interesting work and historically accurate.





#### Middle School Brochure Contest

This contest is directed at students in the 6th, 7th, 8th or 9th grades, depending on which year the American Revolution is taught in their educational system - including ecumenical and home schooled students. If the American Revolution period of American History is technically not specifically covered during these middle school grades, an entry will still be accepted for the competition by the state society. In the case where the local school system, or its equivalent, teaches the American Revolution period of American History, the young person must enter the contest through the school and not as a separate entry. In the case where the local school system does not teach this period of American History, the student may enter through their local Sons of the American Revolution Chapter. Brochures are due to Local Chapter by February 1st, 2023.

Prizes are as follows: 1st Place - \$300 Cash; 2nd Place - \$200 Cash; 3rd Place - \$150 Cash; 4th and 5th Place - \$100 Cash. The cutoff day for entering at the Local Chapter level is February 1st.


The student chooses from any of the five (5) Foundational Documents of the United States as the theme for their brochure.

The brochure will be judged on: Content, Creativity and Correctness. The judging criteria rates highest personally drawn art work and text authored by the student as opposed to cut and paste from books, magazines and the Internet. The use of software tools by the student for creating the brochure, and even the art work, is permissible.






