Member's Corner



Sidney Joseph Francis II (8/12/1932 – 3/25/2024) – It is with sad heart to announce that long time SAR member, Compatriot Sidney Francis, has passed away at age 91. He was born in San Antonio to parents, Mattie and David Francis. The family moved to Luling, Texas in 1936 where Sidney initially attended school. He later attended The San Antonio Academy. After graduation he enrolled at the University of the South in Sewanee, TN and later matriculated to UT Austin.

He enlisted in the Army after graduation serving his time in Germany. He retuned home to live both in Luling and San Antonio where he began his 35 year banking career at Citizens State Bank of Luling. He became the bank president and finally Chairman of the Board until his retirement. In the '60's, Sidney restored his family's 1849 farmhouse on their cotton plantation in Kingsbury, Texas, which was eventually listed in the Historic American Buildings Survey and the National Registry of Historic Places. He was a member of numerous heritage organizations. Sidney will certainly be missed in the community. He was buried on April 1, 2024 at the Luling City Cemetery in Luling, TX.

Thomas Bruce Green, Ill (7/17/1939 – 716/2024) - He was born in Athens, TX. After graduating from North Texas State University, he enrolled in the U.S. Navy Officer's Candidate School. After commissioning, Tom attended the U.S. Navy Deep Sea Diving School. He served on a salvage vessel in Vietnam as well as patrolling near the Panama Canal during the Cuban missile crisis. Tom served as Diving Repair Officer, Gunnery Officer, Navigator, and Training Officer in the Underwater Swimmers Naval School. Tom worked as the Operating Manager for two department stores and later a co-owner of the family grocery store. He also worked in the insurance field as an agency co-owner

and later for the Texas State Department of Insurance. Tom was active in the Sons of the Republic of Texas (SRT) and the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). He was an SRT president. He also served as Texas state president of SAR. Tom earned the George Washington Distinguished Service Award and named the National Color Guardsman of the Year by the National Society Sons of the American Revolution. He collected over 75 historic flags and presented more than 750 Historic Flag Programs. His greatest joy was presenting flag programs to over 30,000 school children from Texas to Indiana. Funeral services were on 7/29/2024 at the St. Peter and Paul Cemetery, New Braunfels, TX.

Compatriots Blair Rudy, Edward Butler, Richard Weitzel, Kevin Kanter, Frank Rohrbough and Jason Chall were in attendance.



Fourth of July Patriotic Ceremony

Ft Sam Houston National Cemetery: Each year, the Order of Granaderos y Damas de Galvez, San Antonio Chapter hosts a patriotic ceremony honoring the heros of the American Revolution, General Bernardo Galvez of Spain, and the original 13 colonies. In 1780, when General Washington was battling the British in the north, General Galvez and his army fought the British in the south capturing the heavily defended Ft. Charlotte forcing the British to surrender. General Galvez and his army fought bravely against England throughout the war never losing a battle against the British soldiers. Battle of Medina Commemoration

On August 17th in Lemming, TX (Near Poteet), Chapter members along with other organizations commemorated the historic Battle of Medina. This is an annual event honoring the nearly 1400 soldiers who gave their life fighting for Mexican independence from Spanish rule.

Battle History

The **Battle of Medina** was fought on August 18, 1813, approximately 20 miles south of modern day downtown San Antonio. It was part of the Mexican War of independence against Spanish authority in Mexico. Spanish troops defeated the Republican Army of the North. This was the deadliest battle in Texas history. The battle with 1400 soldiers lasted for four hours and fewer than 100 soldiers survived. The location of the Battle of Medina has not been archaeologically determined, however, there are three historical markers in the area indicating the possible battle location.

Birth of the Marines

The Second Continental Congress passed a resolution on November 10, 1775, that established two Battalions of Marines to serve as landing forces on land and sea. It was this resolution that marked the birth date of the United States Marine Corps. The Marines immediately distinguished themselves in a number of important operations. Their first amphibious raid was conducted into the Bahamas in March 1776, under the command of Captain Samuel Nicholas.

Captain Nicholas was the first commissioned officer in the Continental Marines and remained the senior Marine officer throughout the American Revolution. Captain Nicholas was promoted and is now considered to be the first Marine Commandant.

The Treaty of Paris in April 1783 was the official end to the Revolutionary War and the last Navy's ships were sold, which put the Continental Navy and Marines went out of existence. July 11, 1798, is a significant day in U.S. history for it was this day that the United States Marine Corps was

re-established as a separate and distinct branch of service. President John Adams and Marine Corps Commandant William W. Burton authorized this rebirth, which esstablished the modern U.S. Marine Corps, which has since grown to become a renowned elite fighting force. The Marine Corps is known for bravery, discipline, and esprit de corps. The Marine Corps' iconic hymn, "Semper Fidelis" was written shortly after the re-birth and remains the Marine Corps hymn today.

Adoption of the Declaration of Independence "The rest of the story"

The Declaration of Independence was adopted July 4, 1776. Congress had voted unanimously to sever all ties with Great Britain. The actual date of the decision to break from Great Britain was July 2nd, but the language of Congress' public announcement was adopted on July 4th. Confusion often arrises because of the date discrepancy and here is the rest of the story.

Richard Henry Lee of Virginia presented the Lee Resolution to Congress on June 7, 1776, calling for a declaration of independence, the creation of foreign alliances and the confederation of the 13 colonies. Congress immediately appointed a committee of five to prepare a declaration of independence, but the vote was tabled until July 2nd.

The Committee of Five, consisting of Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert Livingston were the five tasked with writing the declaration. Thomas Jefferson wrote most of the document with input from the others. Twelve of the 13 colonies, with New York abstaining, voted for independence on July 2nd and the final version was adopted on July 4th.

On the evening of July 4th, about 200 copies of the Declaration of Independence were printed and sent around the country to be read and published in newspapers. The first public readings occurred in Philadelphia in Easton, Pennsylvania and in Trenton, New Jersey. George Washington had the Declaration read to the Continental Army in New York City on July 9th.

The first Declaration did not have the signatures of the 56 signers. Instead, most were added to a parchment copy on August 2nd. Others, not present, signed at later dates. In January, 1777, Congress printed more copies, which included all 56 signatures. This was the first time the world learned who had signed the document. Many of the signers suffered great personal harm during the war because of their loyalties to the American cause. Some signers, such as Thomas Jefferson, Samuel Adams, John Hancock and Benjamin Franklin, went on to become political leaders of the new United States and eventually became heroic and iconic figures of American history.

SAR National Eagle Scout Award Winner


Ricardo N. Lazaro, a 16 year old local student, is dedicated to scouting and has won numerous awards from various organizations. Recently, he was recognized at the SAR National Conference as the nation's "Top Eagle Scout" and won the National SAR Arthur M. & Berdena King Eagle Scout contest. He received \$10,000 as the first place winner. Ricardo completed a very rare feat in the scouting. He earned all 139 merit badges and 23 Eagle Palms, which only 88 out of 130 million Americans who have particiapted in scouting programs in the 113-year history of scouting have accoplished.

His dedication to scouting programs is only part of his accomplishments. Ricardo is a self-taught, trumpet player who learned to play primarily by watching performances of some of the world's greatest trumpeters on YouTube. He played with the Youth Orchestra of San Antonio, Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, National Festival Symphony Orchestra, YOSA Mariachi, and the San Antonio Youth Wind Ensemble (SAYWE). He received the Jeck Kent Cooke Young Artist Fellowship and the S.E. Shires Rising Artist Fellowship. Ricardo earned numerous other musical awards along with his scouting awards and will play "Taps" on Memorial Day at the Ft. Sam Houston Cemetery.

Ricardo placed in the finals of the International Trumpet Guild's Ryan Anthony Memorial Trumpet Competition – Youth Division twice.

He received Honors in instrumental solo competitions through the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS) and the Texas Christian Athletic League (TCAL). He appeared twice on national television playing "Taps" in honor of the fallen children at Robb Elementary school during the Uvalde shooting. His SAR award will let him purchase the three trumpets required for his professional studies and greatly support his music education eventually leading him into the professional world.

In his "spare time", Ricardo remais an honor roll student and ranks at the top of his 11th grade class. Ricardo is truly a remarkable young man who looks to reach very lofty goals.
