Most notable were our chapter youth program winners below:

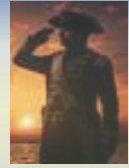

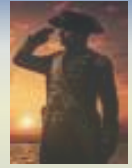

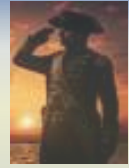

129th Texas State Convention

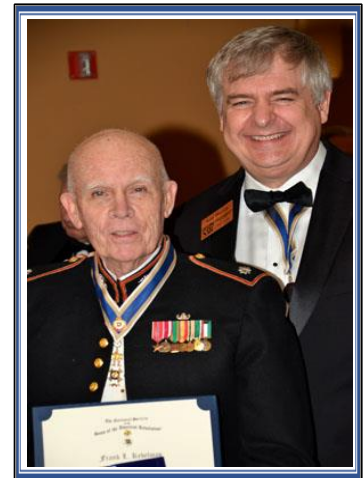

Frank Kebelman – State District 3 VP

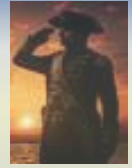
The following are the major award winners:

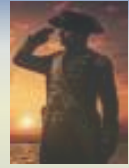

Suzu Zimmerman was in charge of the wonderful Hospitality Room creating for attendees to congregate and relax during the convention.

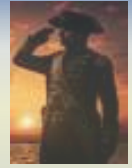
Meg Anderson, president of the **Ladies Auxiliary**, along with other DAR volunteers assisted in running the Hospitality Room for the entire conference.

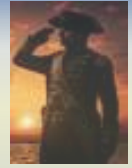

Welcome Home GI



Many, if not most, Vietnam veterans were not welcomed with open arms or recognized for their service when they returned from the Vietnam War. Many were spit on, had eggs (or worse) tossed at them, and were told upon landing in the states, to remove their uniform to avoid trouble with the local population as the civilian communities did not think highly of them. Indeed, this was a shock to the returning veterans, which has lingered for years. Many think that today's "thank you for your service" from retailers comes 50 years too late.

The 2008 Defense Authorization Act empowered the Secretary of Defense to conduct programs between Memorial Day 2012 to Veterans Day 2025 commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War. The primary purpose is to honor Vietnam veterans, including the prisoners of war and those missing in action, their families, and the U.S. allies who contributed during the Vietnam War. There are thousands of participating organizations across the U.S. aiding in this endeavor. Some of the new and even old members may not be aware of this campaign.

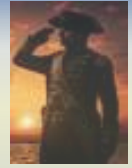
All living U.S. veterans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces between 11/1/1955 to 5/15/1975, are eligible to receive one lapel pin. There is no distinction between locations served during the Vietnam War period. 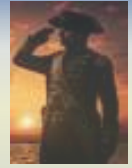
Pilgrimage to the Alamo: The San Antonio Chapter of the Texas Society participated in the Pilgrimage on April 22nd to honor the 180 Texians who fell at the Alamo on March 6, 1836. The Event is hosted yearly by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas (DRT).

Over 75 organizations participated in the event which included the American Legion, Veterans for Foreign Wars and other Patriotic Organizations. When an organization arrived at the Alamo, Compatriot George Harcourt, a member of the SRT, announced them and a military staff member took the organizational wreath to place it on the lawn in front of the Alamo.

President Carla Miller, Alamo Mission Chapter Daughters of the Republic of Texas provided the Welcoming Address. Following the Pledges to the United States and Texas flags and patriotic music by the U.S Air Force Band of the West, Mayor Nirenberg welcomed attendees. The keynote speaker was Lt. Gen. Brian S. Robinson, Commander Air Force Education & Training Command, Joint Base Randolph AFB. A bugler from Band of the West played TAPS.

DAR sources maintain that more than 30 of the defenders of the Alamo were descendants of Patriots of the American Revolution.





Hondo, TX Classical Conversations Program: On April 19, 2024, at the invitation of Mrs. Rebekah Nilson, Classical Conversation Challenge Program, the chapter color guard presented the National Colors for this community event, which was held at the First Baptist Church in Hondo Texas. 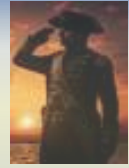
Also attending the event was Nancy Schmid, who is a member of the San Antonio de Bexar DAR Chapter.

Six students in grades 4-6 wrote and read their essays on notable Americans, who did remarkable service from the founding of America and its development from the late 14th to 20th Centuries. These countrymen included Christopher Columbus (Navigator), Thomas Jefferson (3rd US President), Thomas Edison (Inventor), Henry Ford (Industrialist), Mary Cassatt (Painter) and Lance Wade (Fighter Ace in WWII).

30 plus family members as well as friends and guests attended. The Essential Program is led by Tutor, Mrs. Victoria Hurtado, who help the students bridge between the grammar and dialectic learning stages and to prepare students for Classical Conversation.

Following the program, Commander Rohrbough noted that April 19th is “Patriot Day” which is the 249th Anniversary of the Battle of Concord and Lexington in 1775 when the British Army set out from Boston to destroy the American store of weapons supplies and cannons being stored in Concord. These militiamen stood strong for the cause of freedom from English Rule. It was here that the “First Shot Fired” was a spark leading to the American Revolution.

Because this event was held on “Patriot Day” it qualifies as a National SAR Color Guard Event.



Necessary and Proper Clause Texas v. Constitution

What in the world is the “Necessary and Proper Clause” and why is it relevant today you may ask? This clause is found in Article I, Section 8, Clause 18 of the United States Constitution. It was written during the 1787 Constitutional Convention and became an integral part of the Constitution when it went into effect on March 4, 1789. So how can this be important and relevant to the events currently happening in Texas? It is all how “necessary and proper” clause is defined.

The clause is often referred to as the “elastic clause” because it is used to expand the powers of congress in developing new legislation. Perhaps this clause more than any other provision of the constitution has been subject to considerable interpretation and debate regarding the extent of Congress's powers and often requires the Supreme Court to intervene. Since being adopted, the clause has played a significant role in the expansion of federal authority and the development of implied powers, which leads us to Texas v. Constitution.

In the context of the southern border and immigration, the Necessary and Proper Clause could be relevant because Congress has the power to regulate immigration and naturalization under the Constitution. The Clause may also be invoked to justify additional legislation or measures deemed necessary and proper to enforce and implement immigration laws. The debate is, where do Congress’s powers end pertaining to a State’s rights to protect its borders.

For example, Congress might use the clause to pass laws related to border security, immigration enforcement, or the establishment of agencies and procedures to manage immigration processes. However, the specific application, restrictions, and processes may infringe on state’s rights in any given situation, which institutes legal interpretation, debate, and legal challenges.

Most any congressional version of immigration laws as they pertain to state’s restrictions to immigration such as floating barriers, wire, and the National Guard will most likely be defined by the Supreme Court.

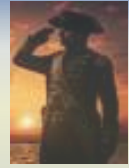
The next time you hear of immigration and/or border issues, you can be sure the Necessary and Proper Clause of the Constitution is going to play a role.**

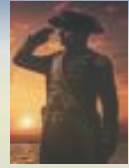

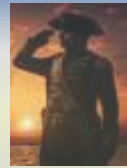
