




Constitution Day Reading: On September 17th. President Blair Rudy celebrated the special national day by reading the entire original Constitution, minus the Bill of Rights, which did not contain the first ten amendments, that were not added until December 15. 1791, on the steps of the Blanco County Courthouse in Johnson City, Texas about 75 miles north of San Antonio. Approximately 20 area residents and area dignitaries attended the event and participated with President Rudy in the reading. A flag certificate was presented to "Blanco County," represented by the Blanco County Commissioner Tommy Weir, in recognition for the flag that flies over the Courthouse daily. SAR members in attendance were President Rudy, Compatariots Ron Finch, Mike Bowles, and Boerne SAR Tisdale, Mike Bowle President Dale Tidwell. (See Pg 12 for more details)

Happy Birthday Air Force: Compartriot Frank Rohrbough led a "salute" to the U.S. Air Force during the September chapter meeting. Additionally, Frank joined two others at the Audie Murphy VA Memorial Hospital to celebrate the 77th Anniversary of the establishment of the U.S. Air Force on September 18, 1947. The event was set up to greet over 30 Air Force Veterans. The veterans were also given Air Force caps and Lapel Pins.

To review a bit of history. President Woodrow Wilson formally transferred aviation from the Army Signal Corps to be under the Secretary of War on July 24, 1918. The Army Reorganization Act of 1920 acomplished several things, but one of the goals was to establish the Air Service as a combatant arm of the Army. The Air Service initially concentrated flying training in Texas.

In June 1930, the Headquarters of the Air Corps Training Center was established at Lackland Army Air Field. In 1931, the Army established the Air Corps Training Center at Randolph Field, San Antonio Texas. It soon became recognized as the "West Point of the Air," The National Security Act of 1947 redesignated the Army Air Corps and created the Department of the Air Force on September 18th, 1947. Gen. Carl A. Spaatz was appointed as the first USAF's Chief of Staff.

Gold Star Family Memorial: On October 4th, Compatriots Blair Rudy and Larry Loop participated in the dedication of the Gold Star Family Monument in Veteran's Square, located near the Tobin Center. In attendance were DAR and SAR members, who are recognized as Gold Star family members. Compatriot Larry Loop is a gold star son from World War II.

Private Carlin E. Loop, Army Air Corp, Medical Division lost his life in 1944 in a B24 Liberator plane that crashed in Papua New Guinea where he was deployed in World War II. The plane was not found until 1983 and his remains and the remains of 21 other passengers were returned to their families for burial.

The gold star designation dates to World War I, when families displayed small banners with either a blue or gold star. A blue star was displayed for every immediate family member serving in the armed forces. If their service member died or was killed while serving in the military, the family placed a gold star over the blue star to let the community know that their loved one died while serving.

Gold Star Mother's Day is observed on the last Sunday of September. The Gold Star Wives was formed before the end of World War II and the Gold Star Lapel Button was established in August 1947

Currently, all Gold Star Family members are recognized for the sacrifices a family member makes when they die in service to the nation. The strength of our nation is our military made up of its soldiers who gain strength from their family's support.



Invention of Hot Air Balloon

Most think of the Wright Brothers when pondering aviation and think flying is a relatively new concept. However, research shows that among many things that occurred during the revolutionary war era, so did aviation as described here.

Curious as to why smoke rises, the French Montgolfier brothers, Joseph-Michel and Jacques-Etienne, conducted experiments with various light weight materials and came to the conclusion a balloon filled with hot air would rise like the smoke they observed.

In the late 18th century, on June 4, 1783, the brothers launched the first hot air filled balloon. The first flight reached an altitude of about 1,000 meters (3280 feet). Later that same year, on September 19, the first "manned" flight was launched. In a small balloon carrying a sheep, duck, and rooster they studied the effects of flight on living creatures. Shortly after conducting some tests, on November 21, 1783, Jean-François Pilâtre de Rozier and François Laurent d'Arlincourt flew the first human flight. This brief, but historic flight, was groundbreaking and laid the foundation for modern aviation.





The first military use of a hot air balloon happened in 1794 during the battle of Fleurus, when the French used the balloon. Jean-Pierre Blanchard became the first person to fly a hot air balloon in various countries, including the United States, the Netherlands, and Germany. His most notable flight crossed the English Channel heading to the Dover Castle accompanied by John Jeffries, which occurred on January 7, 1785.

Happy Birthday Navy

The U.S. Navy is the second oldest military branch. It was originally established on October 13, 1775, when the Continental Congress authorized a few small ships to protect American shipping and combat British naval power during the American Revolutionary War. The Navy faced many challenges during this time due to limited resources and inexperienced personnel, but it still played a crucial role in key victories, such as the Battle of Valcour Island and the triumph at Yorktown.

At the end of the Revolutionary War in 1783, the Navy experienced periods of decline and a need for restructuring, particularly after the Treaty of Paris in 1783. Congress saw no need to continue funding the Navy and directed the Continental Navy to sell its ships and return the sailors to civilian life. After a brief 10 year respite, Congress realized the need to continue to defend the nation's seaborne commerce and once again established the Navy as an active service branch in 1794.

President George Washington, urged Congress to authorize the construction or purchase of six frigates to protect American shipping. The Naval Act of 1794 established a permanent standing navy on 27 March 1794. The Naval Act ordered the construction and manning of six frigates and, by October 1797, the first three were brought into service: USS United States, USS Constellation, and USS Constitution, which is still an active commissioned vessel of the United States Navy, making it the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. Though it no longer serves in combat, it remains an active-duty ship with a crew of Navy personnel, who maintain and sail it for ceremonial purposes. The USS Constitution, also known as "Old Ironsides," is berthed in Boston at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The modern day U.S. Navy is a powerful force capable of projecting American power and influence across the world. It is responsible for maintaining freedom of navigation, conducting maritime operations, and promoting stability and security in international waters. October 13th recognizes the courage and commitment of all the sailors defending American interests on the high seas.

British General Burgoyne Surrenders at Saratoga

The Battle of Saratoga, Setpember – October 1777) was pivitol to the outcome of the Revolutionary War. The American army defeated the far superior British army of 7500 soldiers, which gave the colonies hope that independence was possible and also aided in securing badly needed foreign support to win the war.

General Horatio Gates and his American soldiers exhibited supperior defenses against General Burgeoyne's forces on Bemis Heights, just south of Saratoga. Although the British held off the Americans when the two armies battled, the British losses were over 600 soldiers. Burgoyne's battered forces waited for reinforcements, but none came. This victory was arguably one of the most significant of the Revolutionary War because the defeat of General John Burgoyne's army, which ended his attempt to control the Hudson River Valley. This victory convinced King Louis XVI that the Americans could stand up to and defeat the mighty British Army. Additionally, after the British humiliation at Saratoga, France entered into an alliance with the Americans, which tipped the war in favor of the Americans. After the Saratoga victory, General Benedict Arnold was called a hero for his bravery on the battlefield. This lofty title was soon lost following his betrayal and defection to those remaining loyal to the King.

(Constitution Day Cont.)

There are 27 amendments to the Constitution. The first ten ammendments are the Bill of Rights, not added until December 15, 1791. The 13th and 14th amendments caused the removal of the notion of the 3/5ths of non-free persons for taxation purposes. Also, no longer in effect is the first line of Section 3 regarding the selection of U.S. Senators by the respective state legislatures. This was modified with adoption of the 17th amendment. Some wonder if that was a good idea.

Totes for Veterans. Each year we "pass the hat" to collect donations to cover 10 totes that are given to needy veterans to help out for the holidays. We generally need \$500 in donations to provide the 10 totes to the VA for distribution. As last year, donations will be collected at the November chapter meeting. 2025 Dues Notice

Compatriots,

For those of you who have a deliverable mailing address, your 2025 Dues Notices should be arriving in your home mailbox within the next few weeks. These are sent Bulk Mail to your address of record as of September 1st. If you do not receive one by Thanksgiving, please look for your notice online, and help us get your address corrected.

<u>Note:</u> 2025 dues calculations include a \$3.00 annual assessment to defray expenses which the state will incur in hosting the 2029 National Congress in San Antonio.

Note: Life and Perpetual Members, and those whose dues equal "\$0.00" will <u>NOT</u> receive a bulk-mailed notification. If you wish to receive a Membership ID Card, go to the Online Dues Payment page and enter your National SAR# and Name. An invoice with your membership ID card will be presented for printing.

Texas SAR has voted that Junior Members will not need to pay dues for 2025. Keep in mind that your dues are considered late on January 1, 2025. If they are still unpaid 30 days later - NSSAR will drop you from the rolls and you will start to show a gap in your service and not get your magazine. So.please pay them online or by mail as soon as you can to help your Chapter and avoid a lapse in your SAR Service! As in previous years, you have 3 options for paying your dues.
