General George Washington's Seal Ring

A little known fact about the Sons of the American Revolution is that it possesses an extremely valuable seal ring! This single most valuable property owned by the SAR is a small circular object, about seven-eighths of an inch in diameter, which rests in darkness, untouched for three-hundred sixtyfour days of the year, emerging for only one night annually when a new President General is installed. It shares its space in a safety deposit box with the deed to the SAR Headquarters building, an insurance policy, some stock certificates, and an affidavit about the ring's own origins.

This precious possession is the seal ring owned and worn by General George Washington.

The ring itself is of gold, with a thin band and delicate shank. It is a perfect size ten on a modern mandrel. There is no maker's mark or any inscription whatsoever on the inside. On each outer surface, the metal of the shank is deeply incised to give in



raised relief a stem, three leaves, and a three-part bud or flower at the top, too worn to identify. The annulus of the crown is oval, surrounding and holding in place the setting of light orange carnelian in which is incised the Washington crest: a shield with three stars at the top and two transverse bands beneath; surmounted by a crown containing a griffin; underlain by a ribbon bearing the Latin words *Exitus acta probat*. These words come from line 85 of the second Heroides of Ovid, and are translated literally as *The outcome proves the deed*. A common variation is *The end justifies the means*.

Almost as interesting as the ring is its original box, whjich was also used by General Washington. It is made of varnished wood, possibly birch or fruitwood, and measures three inches wide, three and ninesixteenths inches long, and one inch high. On its cover is a



shield, one inch long and three quarters of an inch wide, inlaid of ivory, much crackled with age. A small brass knob at the front of the lover half controls the catch.

Inside, the lid is lined with lavender silk, now brown and hanging in shreds. A pin holds a card loosely in place in the top pad, stating, "General Washington's Seal Ring. Statement and Affidavit under bottom pad." The bottom pad is covered with velvet, once lavender, but now faded to brown except around a center post where the ring securely rests.

On the rare occasions when the ring is worn, it attracts the greatest of attention and excitement. People look at it with awe and almost reverence. Their greatest wish is to touch it. The ultimate thrill is to be allowed to slip it over the end of a finger and off again. Occasionally there is a skeptic who questions its authenticity, despite the affidavit of William Lanier Washington and the great care given by the SAR to

C.A.R. STATE PROJECT UPDATE

UPDATE ON TEXAS SOCIETY CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVO-LUTION STATE PROJECT "LIBERTY LIVES IN THE LONE STAR STATE!

Dear SAR Compatriots:

On behalf of the Texas Society Children of the American Revolution, I am pleased to share an update with you on our 2023-2024 State Project: "Liberty Lives in the Lone Star State!" Since June, our members have learned about the Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution and how they are living, breathing documents that shape our nation still today. As we approach our nation's 250th birthday, it is more important now than ever that Texas kids are able to experience these documents and the impact they had on the American Revolution - in their own backyards!

We are thrilled that this year's T.S.C.A.R. State Conference will be held at The Morris Family Center for Law & Liberty at HCU (our project beneficiary) April 5-6, 2024! To date, we have been able to raise over half of our fundraising goal in order to:

- ensure 1,776 Texas kids experience the Center, including taking home their very own tricorn hat and pocket Constitution;
- provide 250 classroom book sets on our founding documents for educators to share with their students;
- purchase 1 historically accurate teaching lectern for year-round use in the Center; and
- provide a herd of stick ponies to teach students more about Paul Revere's ride.

But we still need your help! Last year's National Assessment of Educational Progress scores released confirmed that most young people are struggling to understand how government works and the importance of civic participation. Examples include nearly one-third of eighth grade students not being able to accurately describe the structure or function of government, and almost half being unable to identify key concepts from the Declaration of Independence or U.S. Constitution. Imagine what DAR and C.A.R. could do to bring history to life for Texas kids if each chapter simply sponsored a visit for 10 students (\$100), 4 classroom book sets (\$200), or 5 stick ponies (\$300). 



A BRIEF HISTORY OF REGIMENTAL COCKADES

A cockade is an ornamental device derived from the "cock's comb." In its military forms it is a badge denoting regiment or rank, usually made of satin or silk ribbon or cloth. It is

generally gathered and sewn in a circular pattern. Cockades were generally worn on the hat and were often used with green sprigs and feathers to denote the regiment. Two of the better known cockades were the black



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and white "French Alliance" Cockade worn by American soldiers during the revolution and the red, white, and blue cockade worn by French troops.

During the American Revolution a system of cockades and sashes was used to distinguish the officers from the men until it was replaced by the use of epaulets and shoulder boards in 1779. The 3rd United States Infantry (the Old Guard) because of its direct descent from the First American Regiment logically has as its insignia a cockade and plue on a cocked hat (tricorn) surmounting a wreath.

The Texas Regimental Cockade was designed by Jim and Mary Lynn Johnson of the Denton Chapter #23, Texas SAR. Mary Lynn made the cockades entirely by hand and they are pin backed with a safety catch so they may be easily attached to hat or lapel.

The cockades are approximately three inches in diameter and are red on the outside, white in the middle and blue on the inside with a gold star in the center. The Texas Regimental Cockade was adopted by the Texas SAR Color Guard and endorsed by the President of Texas SAR.



Freedom Chapter Honor Guard and the Commemoration of the Vietnam War 50th Anniversary

The Houston National Cemetery held its annual Commemoration of the Vietnam War 50th Anniversary, one day early, Thursday, 28 March 2024 at 0900. On a gorgeous, cool, sun-

filled morning dozens of Veterans and members of the public gathered to honor those who served our nation during this tumultuous time in our history. Master of Ceremonies for the Commemoration Program was Celethia Reed, Assistant Director, Houston National Cemetery. The program was highlighted by a POW/MIA ceremony, a wreath presentation, a widow commemorative certifi-



cate presentation, and Veteran lapel pin presentations to over 25 veterans. Guest Speaker for the celebration was Major General Robert M. Worley II, USAF (ret) and current Executive Director of the Houston Regional Veterans Benefits Administration.

Colors were presented by a Joint Color Guard of the Texas Army National Guard and the U.S.M.C 7 Marines Honor Detail. Freedom Chapter SAR officers, consisting of David Hamaker (current Chapter President), Ed Sellards, Bill Myers, and Art Byram (past Chapter President) proudly served as Honor Guard.

On March 28, 2017, President Donald J. Trump signed into law The Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act of 2017, designating March 29 as National Vietnam War Veterans Day. March 29 was chosen to because it was the day Military Assistance Command Vietnam was deactivated. The United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration honors all United States veterans who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces from November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location.

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President Barack H. Obama officially inaugurated this Commemoration at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., on Memorial Day, May 28, 2012. By Presidential Proclamation, The Vietnam War Commemoration will continue through Veterans Day, November 11, 2025.

MEMORIAL RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The hand of death on April Eighth, two thousand and twenty-four entered our ranks and removed from our midst, COMPATRIOT Terry L. Holden, our venerable and esteemed brother in arms, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT Holden was born on July Fifteenth, Nineteen Hundred Forty-Six at Dayton, Ohio. COMPATRIOT Holden resided in Sherman, Texas. and

W HEREAS, by virtue of the proven patriot service during the Revolutionary War of his ancestor Conrad Cregar and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT Holden successfully proved his direct lineage from the above patriot, and was admitted to membership in the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, on December Second, Two Thousand and Ten as member number 178314 and simultaneously was granted membership in the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, member number, 10850, and

Major K M Van Zandt Chapter Recognized FWPD Officers in Robbery / Police Shooting Incident

On Monday, April 1, 2024, the Major K. M. Van Zandt Chapter honored six Fort Worth Police Officers for their quick response and decisive action in a recent bank robbery / officer wounded incident in the City. The officer was hit two times during the robbery of a local financial institution on Monday afternoon, November 27, 2023, at approximately 3:45 pm resulting in life-threatening injuries to him.

Fort Worth police officers arrived on the scene within one minute of the call going out. Upon arriving, they were informed that a law-enforcement officer working security had been shot at the location.

Officers entered the facility, traversing broken glass on the floor with a layer of fog /smoke in the lobby, along with a heavy smell of fresh gunpowder. They observed several employees standing behind the bank counter who confirmed that an officer was shot, lying on the ground near them. Officer Luis Canizares maintained control of the front lobby while Officer Nicholas Bernal and Sgt. Chris Ramirez relocated behind the counter to provide emergency aid to the injured officer.

Officer Timothy Kinman and Officer Roxanna Sanchez arrived on the scene with a medical kit. Officers Kinman and Canizares began to secure and search the bank's interior. Officer Sanchez along with Officer Bernal began to provide emergency medical aid to the seriously wounded officer. Officer Wesley Anderson aided the other officers in a search and the bank lobby area making it secure for the other officers to provide emergency medical aid to the injured officer.

The swiftness of the six Fort Worth Police officers' immediate, decisive, and effective actions under dire circumstances resulted in a safe conclusion to this dangerous and potentially deadly incident.

Ten Muskets Take Shape

As a group of skeptical Army officers look on, a middle-aged New England inventor and manufacturer dumps the contents of 15 sacks onto a table. Rattling and clanging, the contents spill out in what appears to be a jumble of musket parts-triggers, locks, barrels, stocks, screws, bolts, ramrods, front and rear sights. From the assorted hardware Eli Whitney assembles 10 muskets. The parts from any one of them are interchangeable. He is demonstrating a new idea that is to revolutionize American industrial methods much as his recent invention of the cotton gin had revolutionized Southern plantation life, making cotton so profitable that it dominated the economy of the entire region. The time is 1800. The country is facing a crisis in an undeclared war with France. Arms are needed for defense, and for the frontier. Whitney already had established a musket factory in 1798, and now he is looking for more orders for his plant. With skepticism turning to optimistic belief, the officers give Whitney a contract for more small arms. He employs subcontractors, works out assembly line methods to fill the order. During the coming War of 1812, he will produce 15,000 muskets by the new methods. Although widely remembered today for his cotton gin, Whitney is also regarded as having introduced the concept of interchangeable parts, and the utilization of the division of labor in that early musket factory. The methods and concepts have been used in the later manufacture of firearms in United States arsenals. Whitney's basic ideas, which accelerated the industrial revolution, are today applied the world over in mass production industries.

Texas SAR Patriot Fund

The Alexander Hamilton Medal honors the memory of the first Secretary of the Treasury of the United States. It is awarded to individuals who give \$1,000.00 to the Patriots Fund. Successive \$1,000.00 contributions earn a bronze oak leaf cluster, and five bronze oak leaf clusters can be exchanged for a silver oak leaf cluster. The Alexander Hamilton Pin is awarded to individuals who give \$500.00 to the Patriots Fund. Individuals who gave to the Patriots Fund before 2002 may receive credit for their contributions by producing receipts or showing early pewter pins given for contributions prior to 2007. Proceeds from the Patriots Fund are used to fund the various Youth and Public Service programs of the Texas Society.

ment. I have two sons by my late wife Barbara. My son Kyle lives in nearby Crosby, Texas, and is a Captain with Delta Airlines. Kyle Jr. is a Doctor in San Antonio. the ring since 1922, when it was presented to the SAR. To these skeptics, the SAR can only give a very unscientific answer: when an individual puts it on his or her finger, feels that comfortable fist from decades of wear, and sees the inner glow of translucent orange radiance from the authentic Washington seal ring, that person knows the seal ring is real.

Each incoming President General slips the original Washington seal ring on his finger for but a few minutes during his installation.

The value of the Washington ring cannot be expressed in terms of money. Who could place a price on such a rare and historic object? For security reasons, the SAR is not anxious for speculation or publicity on this subject. No amount of money could measure the mystique of this ring, or the special aura of grandeur, authority, and dignity it bestows upon the office of the SAR President General.

Rules Revision for the Ross L. Shipman Newsletter Competition

The Ross L. Shipman Newsletter Competition Award is presented to a Texas SAR Chapter with the best Newsletter for the calendar year.

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible for competition, submission should be the single issue as determined by the editor/chapter to be <u>the</u> <u>best electronic issue per calendar year</u> to be submitted to the Texas SAR Newsletter Committee chairman. Submissions are preferred by email attachment (PDF or DOCX files) or by the issue URL if located on a chapter web site. The submission must be received by January 15.

Sending all of your newsletter issues to the committee chair does NOT enter the publication into the contest.

The Chapter must publish a minimum of four (4) issues of the newsletter in a calendar year.

JUDGING

Judges will use the following criteria in selecting the winners of the competition.

A. Contains: Chapter activities, a calendar and/or notices

of events; membership information such as welcoming of new members, remembering deceased members, etc.; special observances announced and/or reported; and special stories.

- B. Editorial Content: writing style & content; punctuation; spelling & typographical errors; helpfulness to readers; general interest of articles; identifiable masthead & correct SAR national and state logos; and overall quality.
- C. Appearance: general layout; use of photographs; use of art/graphics; typefaces; and neatness.

Further considerations will be made in the quality of production through quantity of mistakes, typos, and errors. An identifiable masthead with the chapter name and correct SAR logo prominent, the officers' or editor's name given or a contact number, wise use of space, and any pictures are an integral part of the consideration.

Please submit chapter newsletter entries to the Texas SAR Newsletter Committee chairman.

CATEGORIES

An award is presented to a Texas SAR Chapter with the best newsletter in three chapter size categories. The number of pages in a newsletter is not a consideration in the judging process.

- 2. Medium Chapter with 51-100 active members.
- 3. Large Chapter with 101+ active members.

Chapter size is based on the year-end Membership Roster released by Texas SAR.

Every chapter editor considers his newsletter to be excellent and deserving of recognition. Editors are to be commended for the efforts expended. Some subjectivity is incorporated into the judging process in order to provide flexibility in determining the best newsletters. These guidelines should help editors determine if they are meeting the requirement necessary to be competitive. Finally, every editor should remember that good communication is the goal, not awards or accolades, in producing a chapter newsletter. The Texas SAR Newsletter Committee chairman will provide all entries to the Ross L. Shipman Newsletter Committee. The Ross L. Shipman Newsletter Committee will review and evaluate Newsletters in February of each year and determine the winning chapter in each category.

Announcement and awards are presented during the state annual convention.

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How to Submit Items to *The Texas Compatriot*

The Texas Compatriot welcomes submissions from compatriots. Here are some tips on getting your story published.

- Keep your article as short as you can while still telling the story. Send stories in Microsoft Word format to compatriot@txssar.org.
- Send digital photographs as attachments and not embedded into the Word document. They also should be sent to compatriot@txssar.org.
- Make sure your images are high resolution, at least 300 DPI, and that no time or date stamps appear on the images.
- 4. Limit the number of photographs to those you would most like to see published.
- 5. Meet the deadlines published for and in each issue.

Picture Policy

To publish photos of children under the age of 18 in *The Texas Compatriot*, your local chapter newsletter, or on your chapter website, you must have a signed parental form that gives us (the Texas Society SAR) permission to publish the child's name and photo. You can find the form on the Society's public website under **Contest/Programs > Permission/ Release Form**.
